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Statement of historical significance and description of property:

A439

Originally a long, narrow, two-story, brick structure, the Schilling Building, which faces north on East Third Street, was given a new stucco façade in 1905. Extensively altered at ground floor level with the installation of a glass front, the building displays its original four-bay façade at the second floor. The windows are arched, one-over-one, double-hung sash, and superimposed by dentils under eyebrow hoods. The cornice line is elaborate with paired brackets, modillions, rosettes in the frieze and a central arch topped by a finial.

The building appears on the first Sanborn map available (1884) as a saloon. It remained a saloon until after 1892. By the early 1900's, it was a grocery; later it became a variety store. Photographic evidence shows that its façade was originally shorter in stature, gable-fronted and of exposed brick. The stucco and raised ornamented parapet was added later, probably by Schilling in 1905 as the inscription indicates. The original gable line is still visible through the stucco. This could very possibly be the oldest standing brick building on Third Street.

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The Schilling Building on Third Street in the heart of McMinnville's oldest business district was erected about 1880. The building was standing in 1888 when it appeared in the illustration in the West Shore Magazine of the McMinnville National Bank which stood next door (the building is still standing in 1976). In 1888 the Schilling Building had a simple center-pointed decoration on its front elevation centered above the second floor windows. The outline of this original detail can yet be seen through the stucco. In 1905 Schilling redesigned the building's front and added an impressive tin or zinc façade with a half-round pediment arch in the center of the front on which was inscribed "Schilling 1905." The building is two-story, brick construction and faces north. It has four double hung sash windows (one-over-one) on the second floor with graceful eyebrow brick banding above each semi-elliptical opening. The first floor front has been altered several times and now has plate glass windows for display purposes. The 1888 sketch of the building illustrates its original appearance.

The building long served as a saloon and was apparently in such use until about 1910. Charles Berry, when interviewed in 1976, still recalled the pungent smell of old beer that permeated the building when he was a boy. Presently the upstairs apartment is unoccupied. The main floor has been for several years a retail outlet for cloth and sewing machines. In the 1880's the building housed the Boss Saloon. Early in the 20th Century it was the location of Schilling's Variety Store.
