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Statement of historical significance and description of property:

#### B490

This is a rectangular, flat-roofed, two-story building sitting on the northwest corner of the intersection of Third and Evans facing south. The façade is two bays across; the east elevation, six. Upper story windows are the Chicago type: two fixed central panes with one-over-one, double-hung sashes flanking. The upper story is of buff-colored, commonbond brick. Labels of stretchers and sills of headers surround the wood-framed windows. A large cornice line with modillions stretches across the façade and the east elevation approximately two feet below the roofline which is articulated by a course of corbelled headers. A second, simpler cornice line articulates the division between the stories. The ground floor has been altered. It is covered with scored stucco and the façade has been cutaway. Aluminum windows have replaced the originals. The rear elevation which faces an alley is plain red brick with but two unornamented double-hung one-over-one sash windows in the upper story.

In the 1928, this building housed a bank.
