Introduction

Problem Statement:

 Loud cars and motorcycles are racing around town at all hours, using modified and illegal exhaust. These vehicles may be in violation of multiple aws and or ordinances.

Goal:

 Identify the laws/ordinances being broken and enforce them. If no laws apply, then work towards writing laws / ordinances.

City Leadership & Collaboration

- City Council Champion: Identify a specific council member to lead the effort.
- Committee Formation: If necessary, establish a dedicated committee with stakeholders.
- Law Enforcement Liaison: Establish a point of contact within law enforcement to address:

 - Enforcement Solutions: Potential strategies (increased patrols, technology upgrades, etc.).

Proof of Concept for Audio Camera Deployment

Audio Camera Vendor: Not-A-Loud-LLC

September 10, 2024

1. Objective:

 Evaluate the effectiveness of audio cameras in enhancing public safety and environmental monitoring within a defined area of McMinnville.

2. Device Description:

- The audio camera integrates:
 - High-quality video recording capabilities.
 - Multiple microphones for capturing audio from various directions.
 - Advanced audio processing algorithms for noise reduction and sound classification.
 - Secure data storage and transmission protocols.
 - o Integration capabilities with existing surveillance systems (if applicable).

3. Test Location:

- A carefully selected public area (TBD) known for experiencing noise complaints, vandalism, or other safety concerns.
 - Test locations in McMinnville TBD.

4. Duration:

• The Proof of Concept will run for a period of 2-6 months to capture a variety of events and scenarios, including different times of day and days of the week.

5. Evaluation Metrics:

- Effectiveness of audio data in supporting law enforcement investigations (if applicable).
- Accuracy of audio classification algorithms in identifying specific sounds (e.g., gunshots, breaking glass, shouting).
- Operational and maintenance costs associated with the audio camera system.
- · Ease of use.
- (Future) Reduction in reported noise complaints or incidents of vandalism/crime in the test area.
- (Future) Public perception of safety and privacy in the test area.

6. Data Collection and Analysis:

- Audio and video data will be collected and stored in compliance with privacy regulations.
- Access to the data will be restricted to authorized personnel.
- The City of McMinnville, in partnership with law enforcement and/or <u>Not-A-Loud LLC</u>, will
 analyze the data to assess the impact of the audio cameras on public safety and other
 metrics.

7. Success Criteria:

- Effectiveness of audio data in supporting law enforcement investigations.
- Security of data.
- Ease of Use.
- Positive feedback from law enforcement and/or the public regarding the audio camera's contribution to noise enforcement..
- (Future) Demonstration of the audio camera's potential to improve situational awareness and response times.
- (Future) Measurable reduction in noise complaints or incidents in the test area.
- (Future) Acceptable level of public acceptance and minimal privacy concerns.

8. Next Steps:

- If successful, the City of McMinnville will consider expanding the deployment of audio cameras to other areas based on need and budget.
- The Proof of Concept results will inform the development of policies and procedures for the use of audio cameras, including data retention and access protocols.

Important Considerations:

- Data privacy and security measures must be robust and strictly enforced.
- Collaboration with law enforcement and legal counsel is crucial to ensure compliance with all applicable laws and regulations.

3-Day Wind Event-February 23-25, 2025








Crews worked through the storm on scattered outages on Peavine Rd., High Heaven Rd, Westside Rd., Cruickshank Rd., Hill Rd, among others.

3-Day Wind Event-February 23-25, 2025



Fallen tree along lower Peavine Rd. caused outage to approx. 1,100 customers. Crews were able to re-route power and had customers back on in approx. 2.5 hours while repairs continued.





Project Update



Peavine Road Pole Replacement and Reconductoring

- Line crews have been working on upgrading the existing power line on SW Peavine Road from Old Sheridan Road to SW Youngberg Hill Rd.
- To date, 18 poles and 24,000 linear feet of wire have been replaced.
- There are 12 poles (and assoc. wire) left to replace and the project will be complete this summer.
- This project will increase system capacity and reliability.



Project Update

Planned 2025 Water Projects

- NE 27th St.: replace 760 feet of galvanized and cast iron (varying sizes) with ductile iron pipe.
- NE Alpine Avenue: replace 760 feet of 6" cast iron with 10" ductile iron pipe and 450 feet of new 8" ductile iron main extension.
- NE 13th Street: replace 300 feet of 6" cast iron with 8" ductile iron pipe.

Project Scope Includes:

- Seismic retrofit of existing warehouse to immediate occupancy seismic standards
- > New transformer storage yard
- Expansion of administrative/office building (approx. 10,400 sf)
- Seismic retrofit to immediate occupancy seismic standards and interior remodel/upgrades of existing administrative building. (approx. 8,700 sf)
- New parking lot(s)
- Construction Budget \$17 Million

RP3 Award Designation

- McMinnville Water & Light has earned a Platinum Level Reliable Public Power Provider RP₃® designation from the American Public Power Association for providing reliable and safe electric service.
- The RP₃® designation, which lasts for three years (2025-2027), recognizes public power utilities that demonstrate proficiency in four key disciplines: reliability, safety, workforce development, and system improvement. Criteria include sound business practices and a utility-wide commitment to safe and reliable delivery of electricity.

BPA Rates Update

BP-26 rate period (October 1, 2025 through September 30, 2028)

- Power Rates: In February, public power customers and BPA reached a settlement on power rates. The <u>maximum</u> Tier 1 average non-slice rate increase will be 8.3% (compared to 9.8% in BPA's initial proposal).
- Transmission Rates: Settlement has not been reached on the transmission side. The rate proceeding continues and the latest rate increase estimate is still at 20+%.

BPA will issue the Final Record of Decision in July 2025

- In February, Mayor Morris and John Dietz visited Washington, DC to participate in the American Public Power Association (APPA) Legislative Rally.
- This rally was an opportunity to connect with state and federal legislators, engage in critical policy discussions, and advocate for public power.

SUBJECT: Cypress and Fellows Paving Project Contract Award

Report in Brief:

This action is the consideration of a resolution to award a public improvement contract in the amount of \$760,396.60 to K&E Paving Incorporated, DBA H&H Paving, for the Construction of the Cypress and Fellows Paving Project 2024-10.

Background:

Portions of SW Cypress Street and SW Fellows Street are showing signs of pavement and street base failure. GRI performed a pavement evaluation report on January 31, 2024, and provided the City with paving design recommendations to address street failures.

This resurfacing project is broken into three distinct phases (Please reference attachment #2):

- 1. Along SW Fellows Street from SW Oriole Street to the Intersection of SW Fellows and then south on SW Cypress Street to the North property line of Discovery Meadows Park. Street resurfacing also triggers the need to update ADA (PROWAG) curb ramps at intersections. All required ADA (PROWAG) curb ramps are included with Phase 1.
- 2. Along SW Fellows Street from SW Westvale Street to the SW Oriole Street (to the edge of Phase 1 extent).
- 3. Along SW Cypress Street from near SW Locust Street to the intersection of SW Fellows Street and SW Cypress Street (to the edge of Phase 1 extent).

Given the budget constraints and the potential for dealing with unknown quantities of poor subgrade material, City Staff have elected to split this paving project into phases. This allows the City to prioritize rehabilitation of the worse sections first and gives the City the option to release subsequent phases for construction once we know more about the subgrade conditions and confirm the remaining budget is adequate. If subgrade conditions are optimal then the project could have enough budget to rehabilitate the all three phases. If subgrade conditions are less than optimal, subsequent phases may need to be constructed with future funding.

Discussion:

On March 26, 2025, seven bids were received, opened, and publicly read for the construction of Cypress and Fellows Paving Project 2024-10. The bid results are as follows:

Bid #1 – K&E Paving Incorporated DBA H&H Paving -	\$760,396.60
Bid #2 – KNL Industries Incorporated -	\$1,013,718.75
Bid #3 – Knife River Corporation -	\$1,078,078.00
Bid #4 – North Santiam Paving Company -	\$977,993.50
Bid #5 – Roy Houck Construction LLC -	\$965,040.75
Bid #6 – Brix Paving Northwest Incorporated -	\$968,000.00
Bid #7 – S-2 Contractors Incorporated -	\$1,036,238.00

The construction Estimate for this work was \$1,135,000.00

The bids were checked for completeness, including a review of the following:

- Was the bid submitted, on time, in a properly sealed and labeled envelope?
- Was the Bid Form properly filled out and executed?
- Was a Bid Bond included?
- Were the project addenda acknowledged?
- Was the First Tier Subcontractor Form turned in on time?

Seven bids were complete and met the City's requirements. A detailed breakdown of the bids received is on file in the Engineering Department.

The bid from K&E Paving Incorporated DBA H&H Paving, in the amount of \$760,396.60 was deemed to be the lowest responsible and responsive bid.

Fiscal Impact:

Funding for this project is included in the FY25 and FY26 Street Services Fund (45) budget.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt the attached resolution awarding the public improvement contract for the construction of the Cypress and Fellows Paving Project 2024-10, in the amount of \$760.396.60 to K&E Paving Incorporated DBA H&H Paving and an additional budget authority of 10% for project contingency (for dealing with potential subgrade issues).

Whereas, The low bidder, K&E Paving, Incorporated DBA H&H Paving met all of the bid requirements, and should be considered the lowest responsive bidder; and


Whereas, Funding for this project is included in the FY25 and FY 26 Street Services Fund (45) budget.

SUBJECT: 2025 Resolution Establishing a Stormwater Operating and Stormwater

Capital Fund

Report in Brief: The purpose of this resolution is to create two funds to account for stormwater operations separately from wastewater. One is a Stormwater Operating Fund to account for ongoing activities related to a stormwater plan, permitting, and infrastructure. One is a Stormwater Capital Fund to account for large infrastructure construction and repair projects and to hold reserves for future stormwater projects.

Background

A stormwater utility analysis was initiated by the Council through budget adoption in July 2022 to explore more equitable and sustainable ways to fund the operation of the City's stormwater system. The analysis began in October 2022 when the city contracted with the Galardi Rothstein Group to develop a financial needs assessment, rate alternatives, and to provide public engagement assistance. The Galardi team is well known and experienced in the development of stormwater utilities in Oregon.

A stormwater utility is a self-funded enterprise fund dedicated to meeting stormwater operating and capital requirements. The stormwater utility fund concept is broadly recognized, in Oregon and nationally, as an equitable and sustainable approach for management of a community's stormwater system. Stormwater utilities provide financial adequacy and stability to meet environmental regulations and construct and maintain critical infrastructure.

While the funding for the activity related to stormwater requirements remains to be determined, the need to account for the expenses in a separate, dedicated fund is undeniable. These expenses are currently in the Wastewater fund, which is a separate utility with distinct cost drivers and a different customer mix.

As part of the Stormwater Utility Fund Update works session held on February 19, 2025, we discussed the need to establish a new fund in our accounting system to track stormwater activity. There was no objection at that time to creating these funds.

In order to present the FY25-26 budget in a manner that complies with budgetary best practices, we need to create these funds without further delay.

Fiscal Impact:

This action has no fiscal impact and is for accounting and budget presentation only. We are not requesting any change to revenues, expenses, or transfers at this time.

Council Options:

- 1. Approve the establishment of the Stormwater Operating and Capital Funds.
- 2. Do not approve the creation of the new funds. This would require a significant amount of work on the part of staff to reverse work already completed in preparation for the FY26 proposed budget. It would also require restructuring of upcoming work sessions to determine another acceptable option for accounting for stormwater activity.

Whereas, the regulatory environment for management of stormwater quality changed in 2022 with the Mercury Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) requirements; and

Whereas, the City's TMDL implementation plan was adopted by City Council in November 2024; and

Whereas, the City of McMinnville will be required to obtain a permit for stormwater discharged to local drainageways and the North and South forks of the Yamhill River within the next 5-10 years; and

Whereas, such a permit regulates the operation and management of the community's stormwater system; and

Whereas, the operation of a stormwater system is based on impervious surface which is not shared with any other utility; and

Whereas, since the driver of stormwater costs are not shared with other utilities, the established practice across the State of Oregon for tracking the financial activities related to stormwater systems is in a dedicated utility fund; and

Whereas, the stormwater utility concept was presented to City Council on March 29, 2024; and

Whereas, financial activity related to the City's stormwater infrastructure is currently accounted for in the Wastewater fund; and

Whereas, the need to account for stormwater financial activity in a separate fund was presented to Council at a work session on February 19, 2025;
