Please consider this my second formal complaint against Scott Hill, candidate for McMinnville Mayor. Mr. Hill's PAC name is "Re-Elect Scott Hill Mayor" and his PAC number is 20862. I believe Mr. Hill is in violation of city ordinances 5092 and 5096 that state that "dominant contributors" who contribute over \$1,000 in aggregate contributions should be listed on campaign materials.

Mr. Hill received a contribution in the amount of \$2,500 on 10/5/2020 from the political action committee "Oregonians for Affordable Housing", directly associated with Homebuilders Association of Metropolitan Portland.

In addition to the mailers, printed and digital ads described in my first complaint, Mr. Hill has continued to print and advertise digitally in non-compliance of city ordinances 5092 and 5096. Please see attached examples of the violations.

Some of the ads have changed from what was listed in my first complaint, however others have not changed to include the necessary dominant contributors. As you can see, some of his ads now show "Major donors: Oregonians for Affordable Housing, Steven Rupp, Patricia O'Leary, Edward Gormley, Alan Larsen". But, they do not list Oregonians for Affordable Housing PAC's top donors.

Per City Ordinances 5092 and 5096, if dominant contributors include a political action committee, and that committee itself has aggregate contributions of over \$1,000, that committee's top 5 donors must also be listed on each campaign piece. Oregonians for Affordable Housing has multiple large contributions totaling over \$1,000.

Mr. Hill posted an expenditure of \$1,856.00 to News Register Publishing Company on 10/12/20. He also posted an expenditure of \$3443.30 to Oregon Lithoprint on 10/12/20. These expenditures are for printed newspaper advertising and direct mail. The material he is advertising does not meet the campaign finance requirements of City Ordinances 5092 and 5096. In addition, the volume of newspaper ads being published in the News Register does not match the expenditure levels. I believe Mr. Hill has not timely recorded all of his expenditures based on Oregon campaign finance laws. The cost of the volume of his printed and digital advertising in the News Register far exceeds what has been reported.

I believe Mr. Hill has violated state and city campaign finance laws and is subject to penalty.


